Learning happens everywhere and schools should give credit for learning that happens at places like the boy and girl scouts, tutoring services, community theatres, and dance studios.
 - 45% Schools are designed to teach students the most important things they need to know to grow and be ready for their adult lives. While extracurriculars outside school can teach important lessons, they can't substitute for the academic lessons qualified teachers can provide. Plus, there is no way to measure or validate these external activities.
